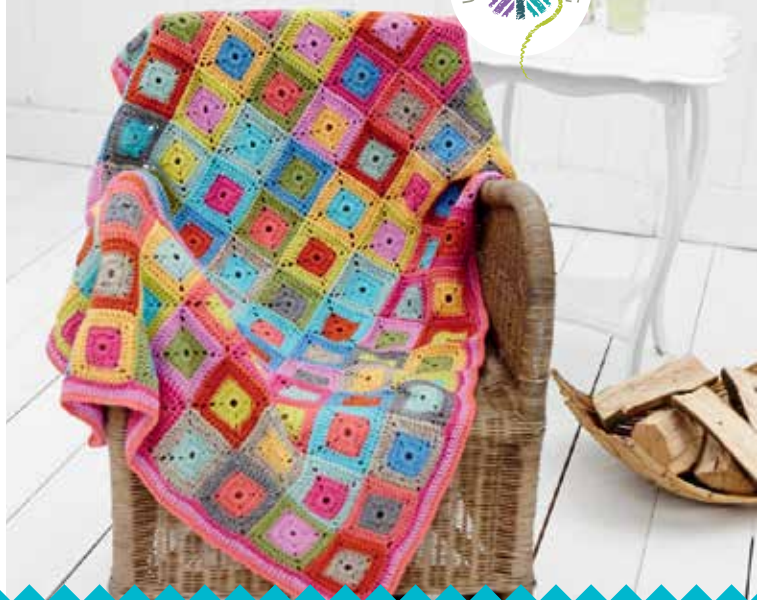

WHAT IS UKHK?

UK Hand Knitting (UKHK) is a not-for-profit organisation dedicated to promoting hand knitting and associated yarn crafts. It has developed a nationwide network of volunteers, who pass on their skills to encourage newcomers to learn to knit or crochet at craft shows and other events across the UK.

The UKHK board members are major distributors of yarn and related products in the UK – James C Brett, Rico Design, Coats Crafts, Designer Yarns, Groves, King Cole,

Sirdar, Norland, Thomas B Ramsden and Stylecraft.

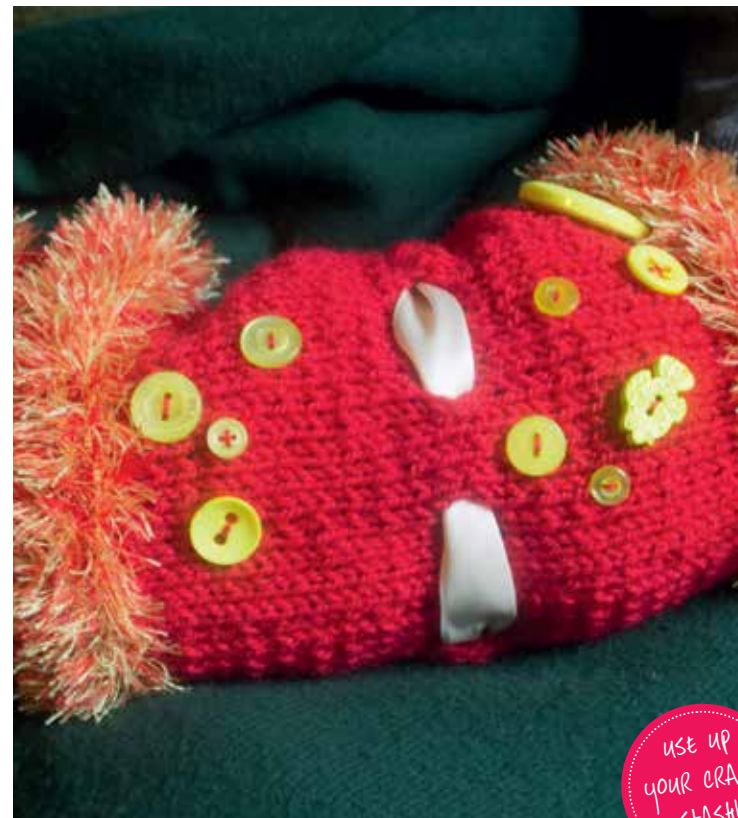
The UKHK website (www.ukhandknitting.com) is a fantastic resource for knitters and crocheters, featuring how-to videos, information on knitting and crocheting workshops across the UK, the latest news, a directory of yarn shops and lots more.

It also features a comprehensive list of over 550 knitting groups in the UK, which can be searched by region to find the ones closest to you.

UKHK members create special patterns for you to buy, the sale of which go towards funding UKHK

activities such as its 'learn to knit' stands at yarn shows. These are available from the website and shops around the country.

If this booklet inspires you to take up your pins and hooks to do more charity crafting, you'll find a special Commit to Knit section on the UKHK website with information on other organisations that are currently accepting donations, plus more free patterns to help you get involved.

BUTTONS & BOWS

*This textured hand muff is an ingenious item to help those with dementia. By **King Cole**.*



TWIDDLEMUFF

YOU WILL NEED

- King Cole, Fashion Aran (70% acrylic, 30% wool, 100g/200m)
1 ball of:
Yarn A Red (009)
- King Cole, Moments (100% polyester, 50g/90m)
1 ball of each:
Yarn B Red (478)
Yarn C Yellow (1610)
- A pair of 5mm needles
- Assorted buttons
- Ribbon or cord

TENSION

Tension is not critical for this project

MEASUREMENTS

30cm (12in) diameter and 30cm (12in) circumference

ABBREVIATIONS

MB Make Bobble: K1, P1, K1 into next st, turn, K3, turn, P3, turn, K3, turn, slip 2nd and then 3rd bobble st over the 1st on left-hand needle, k1tbl

Twiddlemuffs are double thickness handmuffs that are given to those with dementia to provide a stimulation activity for restless hands. Red and yellow are the colours that people with dementia find easiest to see, and the buttons, ribbons and bobbles are designed to be calming as well as creating interesting textures both inside and outside the muff.



K TWIDDLEMUFF

Cast on 54 sts using 5mm needles and Yarn A.
Work 4 rows in garter st.
Change to Yarns B and C held together.
Work 4 rows in garter st.
Change to Yarn A.
Work 8 rows in st st.
Change to Yarns B and C.



Work 6 rows in garter st.
Change to Yarn A.
Cont in st st until work measures 18cm.

Next row (K4, k2tog, yo) 10 times, K4.
Cont in st st until work measures 27cm.

Change to Yarns B and C.
Work 6 rows in g st.
Change to Yarn A.
Work 4 rows in garter st.
Mark end of last row with scrap yarn.
Work 4 rows in garter st.
Work 8 rows in st st.
Change to Yarns B and C.
Work 12 rows in g st.
Change to Yarn A.
Work 8 rows in st st.

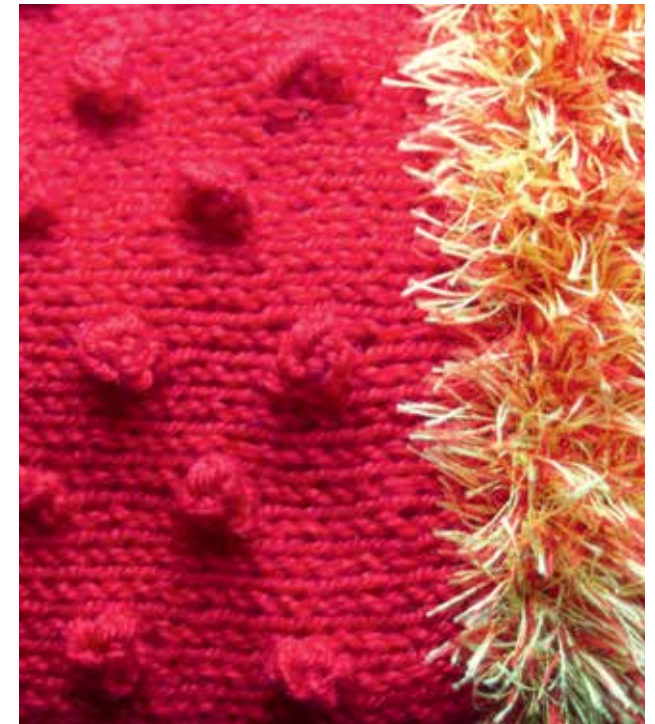
Next row K6, (MB, K7) to end.
Work 3 rows in st st.
Next row K10, (MB, K7) 4 times, MB, K to end.
Work 3 rows in st st.

TWIDDLEMUFF

Rep last 8 rows.
Work 6 more rows in st st.
Work in g st until the second half equals first to marker.
Cast off.

TO MAKE UP

Sew a selection of buttons randomly across the stocking stitch sections. Sew the twiddlemuff into a tube along the long edges. Tuck the lining into the tube using the marked row as a fold line. Secure the folded edge with a line of running stitches. Stitch the cast-off and cast-on edges together at the other end to secure the lining in place. Run ribbon or cords through the eyelets.



Get creative with textures! Knitted bobbles and soft fur yarn are used on this twiddlemuff to create different raised effects.

WHO WOULD LIKE THIS ITEM?

Knit for Peace is an initiative of the Charities Advisory Trust that matches knitters with good causes. Its distribution service is a much-needed resource to help knitters support projects both overseas and in the UK, and sends out knitted items to more than 80 outlets including hospitals, women's refuges, refugee drop-in centres, prisons, community groups and hospices. Knit for Peace is currently looking for adult and children's clothing, baby teddies, bed socks, scarves and adult hats, plus specialist items such as the twiddlemuffs featured here, which the charity distributes via the NHS to patients in hospitals. As well as knitted items, the charity also takes donations of yarn, equipment and money to sustain the work it does. EGG COSY



SIMPLE

EGG-CELLENT IDEA

You'll want to knit a whole set of these funky **Patons** egg cosies, topped with oh-so-cute pom-poms!



EGG COSY

YOU WILL NEED

- Patons, Wool DK (100% wool, 50g/125m)
1 ball of each:
Beach Blue (165)
Passion Fruit (121)
Pink (137)
Natural (102)
Black (199)
- A pair of 3½mm needles

TENSION

Tension is not critical for this project

MEASUREMENTS

14cm (5½in) diameter and 6cm (2in) high

ABBREVIATIONS

Have a go at knitting from a chart to make this sweet little zig-zag stripe egg cosy, and enjoy mixing and matching yarn shades to create your own unique colour combinations.



EGG COSY

Cast on 37 sts using 3½mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 K1, *P1, K1; rep from * to end of row.

Row 2 P1, *K1, P1; rep from * to end of row.

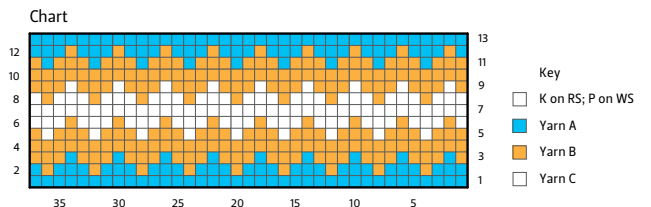
Now continue in st st, working rows 1–13 of Chart.

SHAPING THE TOP
In Yarn A, *P1, p2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [25 sts]
Knit the next row.
Next row *P1, p2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [13 sts]
Next row K2tog, rep to last st, K1. [7 sts]

Thread yarn through rem sts and pull tight. Sew in the ends and make a pom-pom for the top of the cosy.

HOW TO USE OUR CHARTS

Start at the bottom right-hand corner. Read right side rows from right to left and wrong side rows from left to right. A row of squares represents a row of knitting.

YOU WILL NEED

- Wendy, Merino Chunky (100% wool, 50g/65m)
1 ball of each:
Yarn A Pumice (2472)
Yarn B Cloud (2470)
 - A pair of 5mm needles
 - Oddment of black embroidery thread
 - Stuffing
 - Catnip (optional)

TENSION

16 sts and 24 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over st st on 5mm needles

MEASUREMENTS

7.5cm (3in) length from nose to tail

ABBREVIATIONS

For cats awaiting their 'furrever' homes in rescue centres, it can be a long, dull time. A gift of this catnip mouse will make them wait a lot more fun!



K BODY

Cast on 9 sts using 5mm needles and Yarn A.

Row 1 Kfb in every st. [18 sts]

Row 2 Purl.

Row 3 Kfb in every st. [36 sts]

Rows 4–12 Work in st st, beg with a P row.

Row 13 (K4, k2tog) to end. [30 sts]

Row 14 Purl.

Row 15 (K3, k2tog) to end. [24 sts]

Row 16 Purl.

Row 17 (K2, k2tog) to end. [18 sts]

Row 18 Purl.

Row 19 (K1, k2tog) to end. [12 sts]

Row 20 Purl.

Row 21 K2tog to end. [6 sts]

Row 22 Purl.

Row 23 K2tog to end. [3 sts]

This is the nose/head end.

Break yarn leaving a long end. Use this end to thread through the

Use black thread to embroider dots for the nose and eyes.

remaining 3 sts then pull up tight and fasten off. Stitch side seam. Stuff mouse lightly, place a small amount of catnip in the centre of the stuffing if required. Use a running stitch around the base and pull up tight to fasten off.

EARS (MAKE 2 IN YARN A AND 2 IN YARN B)

Cast on 4 sts.

Row 1 and every alt row Purl.

Row 2 K1, (M1, K1) to

CAT TOY

end. [7 sts]

Row 4 K1, M1, K5, M1, K1. [9 sts]

Rows 5–7 Work in st st, beg with a K row.

Row 8 K2togtbl, K5, k2tog. [7 sts]

Row 9 K2togtbl, K3, k2tog. [5 sts]

Row 12 K2togtbl, k3tog then pass 1st stitch over 2nd stitch and fasten off.

With WS together, overstitch a main and contrast coloured ear together and sew in place on head. Repeat for other ear.

TAIL

Cast on 30 sts using Yarn A.

Cast off.

Stitch in place on body.

FINISHING

Embroider eyes and nose and weave in ends. 🧶



Catnip will help make this toy irresistible! Add a little bit to the stuffing before you place it in the mouse's body.

CROCHET BLANKET

RAINBOW BRIGHT

*A colourful blanket will be a wonderful comfort for ill and traumatised children. By **Stylecraft**.*



YOU WILL NEED

■ Stylecraft, Life DK (75% acrylic, 25% wool, 100g/298m)
1 ball of each:
Cascade (2308)
Zing (2356)
Pebble (2327)
Mint (2342)
Clover (2358)
Stone Nepp (2324)
Aqua (2357)
Melon (2359)
Fern (2311)
Lily (2417)
Copper (2312)
Daffodil (2394)
■ A 4mm (US G/6) hook

TENSION

9x9cm (3½x3½in)
square on 4mm hook

MEASUREMENTS

The finished blanket measures 84x114cm (33x45in)

ABBREVIATIONS

Who can fail to smile when they see this cheery design? It would be a great project to make with a group, with each of you contributing a few squares to the finished blanket.



ARRANGING THE SQUARES

The throw is made up of 108 squares, arranged in a rectangle 9 squares wide by 12 squares long. Each square uses 2 colours (A and B), picked at random from the list of 12 colours. Refer to the photograph for more layout details.

YARN ENDS

When changing colour, leave a long end to either work over to neaten or to sew in later.

BASIC SQUARE

Using Yarn A, ch5, sl st into first ch to form a ring.

Round 1 Ch2 (counts as first tr), 4tr into ring, ch3, *5tr into ring, ch3; rep from * twice more, sl st into 2nd of ch2 to join. [20 tr]

Round 2 Ch2 (counts as first tr), 1tr into each of next 4 sts, (1tr, ch3, 1tr

all into corner ch sp, *1tr into each of next 5 sts, (1tr, ch3, 1tr) all into corner ch sp; rep from * twice more, sl st into 2nd of ch2 to join. [28 tr] Cut off yarn, pull through last loop and fasten off.

Round 3 Attach Yarn B into any corner sp, ch5 (counts as first tr and ch 3 sp), 1tr into same corner sp, 1tr into each of next 7 sts, *(1tr, ch3, 1tr) all into corner sp, 1tr into each of next 7 sts; rep from * twice more, sl st into 2nd of ch5 to join. [36 tr]

Round 4 Ch2 (counts as first tr), (1tr, ch3, 1tr) all into corner sp, *1tr into each of next 9 sts, (1tr, ch3, 1tr) all into next corner sp; rep from * twice more, finish with 1tr into each of last 8 sts, sl st into 2nd of ch2 to join. [44 tr] Sew in all yarn ends neatly.

JOINING SQUARES

The squares are joined together along each edge. Place the squares 9 squares wide by 12 squares long on a table or bed, and arrange until you are happy with the order. Sew or crochet the

edges together.

BORDER

With RS facing, attach any colour yarn into any corner sp and work as follows:

Round 1 Ch2 (counts as first tr), (1tr, ch3, 2tr) all into same corner sp, 1tr into each of next 11 sts, *1tr into corner sp, 1tr into join, 1tr into corner sp of next square, 1tr into each of next 11 sts; rep from * to next corner sp, (2tr, ch3, 2tr) all into corner sp. Continue in the same way along the remaining 3 sides, omitting last corner group, sl st into 2nd of ch2 to join. Cut yarn, pull through last loop and fasten off. With RS facing, attach any colour yarn into any corner sp and work as follows:

Round 2 Ch2 (counts as first tr), (1tr, ch3, 2tr) all into same corner sp, 1tr into each tr to next corner sp, *(2tr, ch3, 2tr) all into corner sp, 1tr into each tr to next corner sp. Rep from * twice more, sl st into 2nd of ch2 to join. Cut yarn, pull through last loop and fasten off.

Round 3 As round 2, using any colour yarn. Cut yarn, pull through last loop and fasten off.

TO FINISH

Sew in all yarn ends neatly. Pin out the blanket to the measurements given. Cover with clean, damp tea towels and leave to dry. See ball band for washing and further care instructions.



Work a stripy border around the blanket to finish it off.



Choose the yarns at random to create a bright, colourful look.

WHO WOULD LIKE THIS ITEM?

Send your completed blanket to Project Linus UK, a volunteer organisation that provides a sense of security and comfort to sick and traumatised babies, children and teenagers through the provision of new and homemade knitted, crocheted or patchwork blankets. Project Linus began in the US in 1995 and came to the UK in 2000, where it now has a large network of volunteers and has donated over 260,000 quilts and blankets. Project Linus's volunteers deliver about 2,000 items across the UK each month, providing tangible evidence that someone cares along with the physical reassurance that comes with being snuggled up in a blanket. YOU WILL NEED

- James C Brett, Cotton On (50% acrylic, 50% cotton, 50g/145m)
- 1 ball of each:
 - Yarn A Pink (08)
 - Yarn B Variegated Green (20)
- 3mm crochet hook
- 20cm of 1mm craft wire

TENSION

Tension is not critical for this project

MEASUREMENTS

14cm high

Springtime can be enjoyed all year round when you crochet one of these fabulous pink tulips!



K PETALS (MAKE 5)

Using Yarn A, ch4.

Row 1 Starting in 2nd ch from hook, 3dc.

Row 2 1ch, 2dc in 1st dc, 1dc in next dc, 2dc in third dc. [5 sts]

Row 3 2ch, 1 htr in each dc.

Rows 4 & 5 2ch, 1 htr in each htr.

Row 6 1ch, 1dc in 1st htr, 1htr in next htr, 2tr in next htr, 1htr in next htr, 1 dc in next htr.

Fasten off and weave in ends.

LEAVES (MAKE 2)

Using Yarn B, ch20.

Row 1 Beg in 2nd chain from hook, work as follows down chain: 4dc, 3htr, 4tr, 2htr, 3dc, 2ss, 3ss in last ch.

Turn work and work along the other side of

ch as follows: 2ss, 3dc, 2htr, 4tr, 3htr, 4dc. Fasten off and weave in ends.

STEM

Using Yarn B, ch26.

Row 1 Beg in 2nd ch from hook, 25dc.

Rows 2–5 1ch, work 1dc in each dc. Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Fold and trim wire to make a core for the stem. Roll stem around core and stitch the edge in place up the back of the stem. Stitch the leaves to the base of the stem. Overlap petals and stitch the edges to the next petal about halfway up, to form a cup with a small space at the base. The gap should just allow the stem through. Push the top of the stem into the flower and stitch the petals in place on the inside. Pull petals and leaves into shape.

WHO WOULD LIKE THIS ITEM?

In 2015, a group of 20 mothers launched a campaign called Knit a Tulip for ME. They called themselves the AYME Mums, as their children are all members of the Association of Young People with ME (AYME) and their aim was to knit 25,000 tulips, one for each of the children thought to be affected by the condition in the UK. This year the AYME Mums are continuing to fundraise for AYME and other ME charities. Visit www.justgiving.com/Knitatulip.

SIRDAR

PREMATURE BABY HAT

YOU WILL NEED

- Sirdar, Snuggly DK (55% nylon, 45% acrylic, 50g/165m)
- 1 ball of Wobble (403)
- A pair of 4mm needles
- A pair of 3¼mm needles

TENSION

22 sts and 28 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over st st using 4mm needles

MEASUREMENTS

22.5 (26)cm actual hat circumference – to fit babies born 27-31 (32-34) weeks

ABBREVIATIONS

For those babies who make an appearance early, this teeny hat will help keep them toasty.



HAT

Cast on 49 (57) sts using 3¼mm needles.
Row 1 K1, (P1, K1) to end.
Row 2 P1, (K1, P1) to end.
 Rep rows 1 & 2, 6 times.
Next row P7, p2tog, (P6 (8), p2tog) 4 times, P8. [44 (52) sts]

Change to 4mm needles.

Row 1 Knit.
Row 2 Purl.
Row 3 K2, P1, (K3, P1) to last st, K1.
Row 4 Purl.
Rows 5 & 6 As rows 1 & 2.
Row 7 K4, P1, (K3, P1) to last 3 sts, K3.
Row 8 Purl.
 Rep rows 1–8 until Hat measures 9cm, ending with a WS row.

SHAPE CROWN

Row 1 Patt 4 (5),

patt2tog, (patt 4 (5), patt2tog) 6 times, patt 2 (3). [37 (45) sts]

Row 2 and all alt rows. Purl.

Row 3 Patt 3 (4), patt2tog, (patt 3 (4), patt2tog) 6 times, patt 2 (3). [30 (38) sts]

Row 5 Patt 2 (3), patt2tog, (patt 2 (3), patt2tog) 6 times, patt 2 (3). [23 (31) sts]

Row 7 Patt 1 (2), patt2tog, (patt 1 (2), patt2tog) 6 times, patt 2 (3). [16 (24) sts]

Row 9 Patt 0 (1), (patt2tog) 8 (1) times, (patt 0 (1), patt2tog) 0 (6) times, patt 0 (3). [8 (17) sts]

Row 10 Patt 0 (1), (patt2tog) 0 (8) times. [8 (9) sts].

Cut yarn, draw through rem sts and fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Sew in ends and join back seam, reversing sewing for turn up rib.

WHO WOULD LIKE THIS ITEM?

Bonnie Babies sends premature clothes and blankets to more than 150 UK special care baby units, helping hospital staff dress tiny arrivals and giving a message of support to parents. The charity welcomes items that are knitted, crocheted or sewn, and its goal for the first half of 2016 is to send out 3,000 blankets and 3,000 cardigans. 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CABLE HAT



KEEPING COSY

*This toasty hat by **Rico Design** is sure to help the recipient stay warm on a cold night.*



CABLE HAT

YOU WILL NEED

- Rico Design, Essentials Merino DK, (100% wool, 50g/120m)
 - 2 balls of Burgundy (009)
 - A pair of 3¼mm needles
 - A pair of 4mm needles
 - A cable needle
- For yarn stockists contact your local Rico Design retailer or online stockist

TENSION

27 sts and 31 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) over pattern on 4mm needles

MEASUREMENTS

53cm (21in) diameter

ABBREVIATIONS

C10B slip 5 sts onto cn, hold at back of work, K5 from left-hand needle, K5 from cn
C6B slip 3 sts onto cn, hold at back of work, K3 from left-hand needle, K3 from cn

Warm hats are always welcome items of clothing when it's chilly, and Rico's unisex design has a ribbed brim to make it extra snug. The cables create a lovely texture, and once you've mastered the cabling pattern the hat will knit up quickly. Finish with a jaunty pompom!



CABLE HAT

Cast on 142 sts using 3¼mm needles and thumb method.
Row 1 *K2, P2; rep from * to last 2 sts, K2.
Row 2 *P2, K2; rep from * to last 2 sts, P2.
 These 2 rows will now be referred to as 2x2 rib.
 Cont in 2x2 rib until work measures 9cm, ending with a RS row.
Next row P to end inc 3 sts evenly across row. [145 sts]

Change to 4mm needles and work as follows:

Row 1 *P6, K10; rep from * to last st, P1.
Row 2 K1, *P10, K6; rep from * to end.
 Rep rows 1 & 2 once.
Row 5 *P6, C10B; rep from * to last st, P1.

Row 6 As row 2.
 Rep rows 1 & 2, 4 times.
 These 14 rows form patt.
 Work 28 rows more in patt.

SHAPE CROWN

Row 1 *P2togtbl, P2, p2tog, K10; rep from * to last st, P1. [127 sts]
Row 2 K1, *P10, K4; rep from * to end.
Row 3 *P2togtbl, p2tog, K10; rep from * to last st, P1. [109 sts]
Row 4 K1, *P10, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 5 *P2, C10B; rep from * to last st, P1.
Row 6 K1, *P10, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 7 *P2, sl1, K1, pssso, K6, k2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [91 sts]
Row 8 K1, *P8, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 9 *P2, sl1, K1, pssso, K4, k2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [73 sts]
Row 10 K1, *P6, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 11 *P2, C6B; rep from * to last st, P1.
Row 12 K1, *P6, K2; rep from * to end.
Row 13 *P2, sl1, K1, pssso, K2, k2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [55 sts]

CABLE HAT

Row 14 K1, *P4, K2; rep from * to end.

Row 15 *P2, sl1, K1, pssso, k2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [37 sts]

Row 16 K1, *P2, K2; rep from * to end.


Row 17 *P2tog, k2tog; rep from * to last st, P1. [19 sts]

Row 18 K1, *p2tog; rep from * to end. [10 sts]

Break yarn and thread through rem 10 sts. Fasten off.

TO MAKE UP

Weave in ends and sew back seam, reversing sewing for 8cm for turnback. Make a 12cm diameter pompom and attach to the crown. Cover with a clean,

damp tea towel and leave until dry. See ball band for washing and further care instructions. 

STEP-BY-STEP C6B CABLE 6 BACK



1 Purl up to where your cable is going to begin. Slip the next 3 stitches onto the cable needle.



2 Take the cable needle and stitches to the back of the knitting. Knit the next 3 stitches, pulling the first stitch tight to avoid ladders.



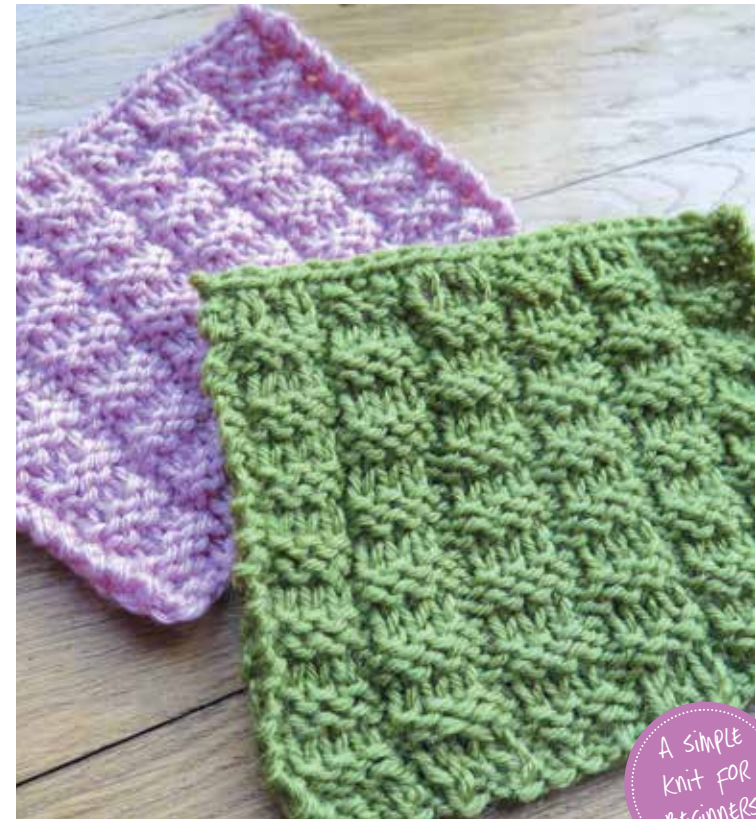
3 Bring the cable needle to the front of the knitting and knit the 3 stitches from the cable needle, then continue.

YOU WILL NEED

■ DY Choice, Aran With Wool (75% polyacryl, 25% wool, 100g/100m)
1 ball in your preferred shade

■ A pair of 5mm needles

TENSION

16.5 sts and 20 rows to measure 10x10cm (4x4in) in pattern on 5mm needles

MEASUREMENTS

20x20cm (8x8in)

Making simple squares takes no time at all, so they're a great project for knitting on the go.

KNITTING SQUARE

Cast on 27 sts using 5mm needles.

Row 1 K1, (P1, K1) 13 times.

Row 2 K1, (K5, P3) 3 times, K2.

Row 3 K1, P1, (K3, P5) 3 times, K1.

Row 4 (K2, P3, K3) 3 times, K3.

Row 5 K1, (P5, K3) 3 times, P1, K1.

Rows 6–29 Rep rows 2–5.

Row 30 K2, (P1, K1) 12 times, K1.

Cast off.

TO MAKE UP

Sew in ends. If desired, sew squares together in 5x7 rows to make a blanket.



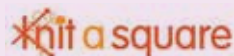
